Introduction to Acting

Course Description:

This one trimester course is for students who have an interest in furthering their knowledge of acting techniques as well as some of the history of the modern theater. This class will involve much class participation as it explores the role that the "self" plays in acting, as well as the ability to perform in front of an audience. This class is a theater credit, and will require both memorization and performance. All interested students grades 9-12 may enroll.

Course Objectives:

This course is a great introduction to the exploration of self and theatre. This class will require reading, writing, group work, memorization, and performance. Students will gain confidence in their abilities to analyze character, read and perform Shakespeare, and will ultimately become better public speakers as a result of the class.

Student Objectives:

The Student will...

- 1) Read and comprehend both contemporary and Shakespearean plays.
- 2) Make character choices based on textual evidence.
- 3) Memorize text.
- 4) Participate in group work.
- 5) Take responsibility for individual projects.
- 6) Use the craft of performance to convey meaning.
- 7) Reflect on performance process in both oral and written forms.

- 7) Memorizing and performing a monologue. (C.1, C.2, C.3, C.4, C.5, P.1, P.2, P.3, P.4, R.1, R.2, R.4)
- 8) Developing and performing a pantomime set to music. (C.1, C.2, C.3, C.4, C.5, P.1, P.2, P.3, P.4, R.1, R.2, R.4)
- 9) Performing a scene from *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. (C.1, C.2, C.3, C.4, C.5, P.1, P.2, P.3, P.4, R.1, R.2, R.3, R.4)
- 10)Reflecting on the performance. (R.1, R.2, R.3, R.4)
